# TOOLS FOR ENGAGING LANDOWNERS EFFECTIVELY

Since its launch in 2010, SFFI's flagship program, Tools for Engaging Landowners Effectively (TELE) has been delivering trainings and resources that increase the capacity of natural resource professionals to engage private landowners to better achieve conservation and land management goals.

By the end of 2018, TELE will have trained more than **1,400** natural resource professionals representing more than **500** organizations from **39** states at our workshops.

# How we're affecting the landscape

In a recent survey of TELE graduates (N = 204), 68% reported having applied the TELE methodology to a project after attending a workshop. This covers more than **120 unique projects**. Of those, 80 respondents included project outcomes, cumulatively reporting more than **15,000 landowners** taking action on more than **730,000 acres** of land. These reports are from a representative sample of only 15% of TELE graduates, indicating that the application and impact of TELE is much greater.


TELE graduates have given more than 30 presentations about TELE principles throughout the country.

## Sharing resources and insights

Many organizations continue to struggle with monitoring and evaluation of their outreach. To address this issue, SFFI is launching a series of articles highlighting successful evaluation efforts and the value they provide to partnerships. We are also working on a framework to help organizations better integrate tracking into their efforts during program development.

We continue to work with constituents to address emerging issues by

- Creating tools and support networks for TELE graduates to successfully lead partnerships in implementing the TELE methodology
- Piloting strategic planning workshops to guide landscape scale partnerships in setting goals and addressing challenges
- Building capacity around working with underserved landowner populations through research, workshops, and resource development
